The Arnolfini Portrait is a 1434 oil painting on oak panel by the Early Netherlandish painter Jan van Eyck. It forms a full-length double portrait, believed to depict the Italian merchant Giovanni di Nicolao Arnolfini and his wife, presumably in their residence at the Flemish city of Bruges. It is considered one of the most original and complex paintings in Western art, because of its beauty, complex iconography, geometric orthogonal perspective, and expansion of the picture space with the use o

The Double portrait passed by descent to Mary of Hungary, who had moved to Spain in 1556. Her inventory from around 1558 includes the following: 'a large panel, with two doors with which it closes, and in it a man and a woman who take each other's hands, with a mirror in which the said man and woman are shown, and on the doors the arms of Don Diego de Guevara; done by Juanes de Hec, in the year 1434.'

The confusion about the subject certainly arrives from the numerous details that Northern Renaissance is distinguished for, with every single one of them entailing specific symbolism.

It is a 82-per-60 cm oil painting made in 1434 on oak panel and it features a double portrait of the Italian merchant Giovanni di Nicolao Arnolfini and his wife, presumably in their Flemish home.
